# PROGRAM AIMED AT INSPIRING YOUNG ENTREPRENEURS LAUNCHES

Kimberly High School and Heart of the Valley Chamber of Commerce is teaming up to bring entrepreneurship to the classroom via a new class called INCubatoredu. INCubatoredu, a national program, offers an authentic entrepreneurship experience as students build a business in this semester-long course. Students trade out theory and simulation for real market experiences with processes that entrepreneurs use today.



Over 30 local entrepreneurs and business experts serve as volunteer coaches and mentors guiding student teams. The businesses that students build are real, which means students experience mistakes, take risks, and learn to pivot based on market needs. More importantly coaches and mentors empower students to identify an opportunity, create solutions, and embrace failure and change.

This semester's student teams have been busy researching their ideas and developing their business model canvas (BMC). As the course concludes, students will "pitch" their idea to a board of directors in a Shark-Tank style event. Take a look what the teams have chosen as their business ideas:

- Port Pillow a seatbelt attachment for cancer patients to minimize the discomfort of the port when wearing a seatbelt.
- LYFF Smart a device or app that helps correct weightlifting form and minimize back pain or other injuries.
- *Frontier Cooler Organizer* designed for campers and tailgaters to maximize the efficiency of their cooler space.
- SAGE Financial a website intended for young adults to help them learn about investing and planning for their future.
- LineScape waiting in a line can result in unhappy customers. This app will reward customers, making it "worth the wait".
- Gas Can Gadget designed for people who struggle and/or spill when filling their lawnmower, snowblower, or other tools.
   This device attaches to your gas can and simplifies the task.
- RestaurHUNT a user-friendly app designed to help business travelers, people who are new to the area, or even local residents discover local restaurants, explore their menus and provide reviews.

# KHS NAMED LEVEL 1 ADVANCED PLACEMENT PACESETTER SCHOOL

Kimberly High School (KHS) received a Level 1 Advanced Placement (AP) Pacesetter Award from the Wisconsin Advanced Placement Advisory Council. The Advanced Placement program allows students the chance to tackle college-level work while they're still in high school. By taking AP Exams, students can earn college credit and placement. There is also a financial advantage to earning AP credits while in high school, which helps students and families lessen higher education costs.

The Pacesetter Awards are unique to Wisconsin and are earned based on the percent of students participating in college courses combined with each student's AP Exam scores. To be recognized as a Pacesetter Level 1 School, more than 30% of students at the school must take AP exams and more than 70% of those test-takers must receive a score of 3 or higher (students must receive a 3 or above to receive Advanced Placement credit).

Of the 514 public high schools in Wisconsin, KHS is one of only 20 schools to be recognized with a Level 1 Advanced Placement Pacesetter Award.
